Over the past century, our town, once known as Squash Bend, has transformed from a small farming community of 190 at its founding to a town of more than 21,000 neighbors. We're glad you're here.

Think of this as one of those quick-start guides that comes with your new TV. If you're new to town, this guide is intended to help you find your footing. If you've been around here a bit, we hope it helps you feel more connected. If you need to connect to a human, visit City Hall at 360 N. Main Street or call (319) 626-5700. How Do I Get Started?

Here are some common questions asked by new residents. More FAQs can be found at northlibertyiowa.org/FAQ.

How do I sign up for utilities?

Sign up for water, waste water, trash and recycling through the city, either in person at City Hall or online. Gas, electric, phone, television and internet are provided by private utility companies.

How do I get a different trash bin?

We offer three different collection options to fit different needs and budgets. When you move in, you should find trash and recycling carts. You can change your garbage option or add curbside compost, through City Hall or online.

Where do I get my pet license?

All dogs and cats older than four months should be licensed. Register online or at City Hall. You can find current fees and a form at northlibertyiowa.org/petlicense. You can also get a pass for Red Fern Dog Park.

Can I park on the public street?

For the most part yes, unless the street has signs saying otherwise. But you also can't park on the street when the city has declared an on-street parking prohibition to allow crews to efficiently clear snow from streets.

Can I get help with food or other services?

The North Liberty Community Pantry, online at nlcpantry.org, has been serving our community for three decades and is a great place to start for neighbors who need food, clothing or other items. They're a connection to other local agencies for additional resources.

Where do get my driver's license?

The closest station is in Coralville, and you can make an appointment at iowadot.gov/mvd.

Where do I register to vote?


You can register with the Johnson County Auditor or when you get a driver's license. If you're already registered, you'll need to update your address when you move. For details, just visit johnsoncountyiowa.gov/auditor/elections.

Parks, Trails & Greenspace

Discover public spaces near you!

Centennial Park

1565 St. Andrews Drive

Our largest park and home to many of our community's events. Centennial Park is currently home to play structures, a walking trail, a great lawn and the state's largest bioswale, but in 2025 will celebrate the opening of an amphitheater and event center, followed by splashpad and more play structures, shelters and additional trail.

Penn Meadows Park

310 N. Dubuque Street

Know someone playing baseball? It'll probably be here. In addition to nine ball fields, Penn Meadows is home to tennis and pickleball courts, a splashpad and play structures and picnic shelters.

Liberty Centre

820 W Cherry Street

It's not just home to some of your favorite places to eat. The pond is stocked by the lowa Department of Natural Resources and its trail, cleared year-round, sees lots of walkers.

Red Fern Dog Park

980 North Liberty Road

A public place for off-leash dogs, the park offers dedicated spots for small dogs, a walking trail and lots of grass for happy pups.

Ranshaw House

515 Community Drive

This restored home, built in 1908, offers space for local non-profits and free programs, like the city's Youth Council, live music each Friday in June and July and Summer Lunch & Fun.

Multi-use Trails

We have more than 25 miles of trails and sidepaths in town, with connections to nearby communities, perfect for recreating or commuting.

Plaza at City Hall

360 N. Main Street

The public plaza at City Hall is a great gathering place in Old Town, North Liberty's original footprint, and offers hometown community events in the summer months.

The Community Center is the Center of Your Community

The North Liberty Community Center, 520 W. Cherry Street, is home to our library, recreation center and pools. Residents can use the indoor track for free year-round, participate in a variety of classes and programs, and get space for a meeting, birthday party, fundraiser and more.

Daily Use, Memberships & Passes

Our recreation facilities include indoor and outdoor pools, two gyms, an indoor track, weight and cardio equipment, meeting rooms and an indoor play area. A variety of facility passes and memberships are available. Financial aid is available for passes and classes; inquire with the front desk. North Liberty residents can use the indoor track year-round for free.

Get a Library Card

Your library card is your pass to books, movies, databases, audio books, our digital collection and even cake pans. Get yours, for free, of course. Bring your photo ID and, if it doesn't include your current address, a piece of mail.

Reserving Community Facilities

Our Recreation Department rents out gyms, pools, meeting rooms and park facilities. Contact the Recreation Department at (319) 626-5716. Additional space is available at the library primarily for community organizations. Contact the North Liberty Library at (319) 626-5601.

Before- and After-School and Camps


Our popular Recsters program offers childcare during the school year, on school holidays and during the summer.

Indoor and Outdoor Pools

The Pacha Aquatics Center has a year-round indoor pool, popular with lap swimmers and kids learning to swim as well as families during open swim times, and an outdoor pool with slides and other play features that is busy during the summer season.

Financial Assistance

Ranshaw House

Just north of the Community Center is the historic Ranshaw House. Built in 1908 and refurbished this century, the house is home to free programs and offers space to local social service agencies for a home base in North Liberty.

City Government

City Hall

City Hall, now in the new permanent building at 360 N. Main St., is the city's administrative office.

Mayor & City Council

North Liberty is governed by a city council of five members and a non-voting mayor, each serving a four-year term in office. Together, the city council sets policy, budgets and local laws. You can contact the entire council via email at council@northlibertyiowa.org.

The council oversees City Administrator Ryan Heiar, who operates the city's day-to-day business and staff.

Building North Liberty's Next Stage

Centennial Park's event center opens fall 2025.

The event hall at Centennial Park is the perfect for business meetings, graduation and birthday parties, networking events, family reunions, weddings and other special events, and reservations are now available.

With access to a catering prep kitchen, two private dressing rooms, modern audio-visual equipment and built-in colored accent lighting to customize every event, the Centennial Center is a premier venue in the heart of the corridor.

Advisory Commissions

The mayor and city council appoint the members of several boards and commissions that make recommendations on issues such as development, parks and other local issues. Volunteer commissioners are appointed each spring, with the application available on our website.

Meetings

City council meetings are regularly held at 6:00 p.m. on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, and streamed live on our website, Facebook and YouTube. Meetings are held in the City Hall and you can attend — and comment at — these meetings live in person.







Community Events

Meet the trucks and drivers and others who keep the city going at this public works showcase.

Playground Crawl

Spend the afternoon exploring the city's playgrounds and parks, with treats and activities at each stop.

Free Fishing Weekend

Spend the day outdoors and fish without a license at Liberty Centre Pond. Held the first full weekend each June.

Summer Reading Program

Reading challenges and events for all ages, all summer long. Coordinated by the North Liberty Library. Held each summer.

Ranshaw House Concert Series

Bring a picnic, meet friends and enjoy live performances from local musicians at the historic Ranshaw House. Held Fridays in June and July.

Summer Lunch & Fun

Providing a free, healthy meal for all North Liberty kids up to age 18 each weekday of the summer.

Movies on the Plaza

Meet at the plaza at City Hall for family-friendly movies on the lawn. Bring a blanket and meet your neighbors. Held in the summer.

Blues & BBQ

A day of live music, mouthwatering barbecue, lowa craft beer and family fun. Held the second Saturday of each July.

Street Dance

Celebrate a great summer, and get ready for the school year, with one last hurrah. Held the weekend before the start of school.

Halloween Trail

Friendly ghosts are out, and you're invited. Come in costume and have a fun, not-so-frightful time. Held each October.

Breakfast with Santa

A hot breakfast and chance share a Christmas wishlist with Santa. Held each December.





What are Neighborhood Ambassadors?

They're volunteers passionate about advancing the quality of life for their neighbors. These onthe-ground local leaders partner with the city to help close the information gap between the city and residents, build community through gatherings and projects, and connect neighbors to each other and to community resources.

Ambassadors are community minded, value diversity and are the eyes, ears and voices for their corners of North Liberty.

Future Ambassadors get behind-the-scene tours of City facilities, engage in conversations with staff and learn the intricacies of city government while developing a strong sense of community.

North Liberty Youth Council

Established in 2022, the North Liberty Youth Council invites local high school students to engage more deeply with the city, develop leadership skills, plan and host community events, support the community through service projects and advocate for other young people in North Liberty.

Participation in the North Liberty Youth Council requires around three to six hours of service each month. This includes attending Youth Council meetings, participating in group service projects and planning and hosting Youth Council-sponsored community engagement events and programs throughout the year.

Youth Council meetings are held at the Ranshaw House twice a month and include regular opportunities to engage with city staff and community leaders.
